
How Soon is Now? February 22nd 6:30 PM

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



LISA DAVIDSON

I remembered loving the endless possibility of monotype printing way back in secondary school in New Zealand. The vibrancy of the colour combinations and textures dazzled me and I started to see abstract land and seascapes within the prints. The colours and forms suggest groupings, and the groupings create narratives that interest me. Each piece has a visual story, and finding the story is part of what inspires the piece to come together.

Creating each piece is a puzzle. I have to find the colours, textures, and forms that resonate together, and suggest a story. It feels more discovered than created by me... and that is what I find endlessly appealing.

SUSAN GRASECK

Introduced to watercolor by her grandmother who took her on painting excursions as a child, Susan developed over time a fascination with color, texture, and lines—visual abstractions that found early expression in her weaving, batik, furniture design, and even architectural plans for her owner-built home where she and her husband have lived for more than forty years.

SALLY ROGERS

My work as a quilter spans 55 of my 69 years. I learned to sew at age 10, made my first quilt at 16 and have continued to sew and make quilts ever since. All artwork is informed by our life's experiences. Music and art share many of the same elements: line, form, color, tempo, etc. While I do think a lot in terms of these elements as I sew, I am mostly an intuitive quilter. I'm always asking the question, "What if...?"

Collaboration and Cooperation

How well do you know your Town?

Webster is a great place to live. It has a glorious past and a promising future. Residents are committed to the Town and spend time volunteering on committees and boards to help make our Town the best it can be. But how well do we really know our Town? Try this short quiz

I think some of the answers will surprise you. Webster's median household income is \$64,305; our Town has the highest unemployment rate (2.7%) of all area towns. We have 15% non-native English speakers and when compared with other non-English languages spoken, Spanish is the most frequently spoken other language. Finally of the area towns, Webster supports the most subsidized housing.

Not only has the Town changed, but the services provided to the Town have changed in response to our community.

The library is no longer simply a repository of information, the library is now a resource for the community offering classes and services to our residents. For example, our Wi-Fi sessions have increased 25% when compared with 2021; our computer use has increased 75% when compared with computer use in 2021. The Library of Things circulation now includes: mobile Wi-Fi hotspots; Google Chromebooks and STEM kits for children.

So, while the Town has changed, the library has also changed in response to the Town. Services and programs based in the library support our continued growth and help to bring resources to our entire community.
