
STEM BEGINNINGS





Science is bouncy! Mix some simple ingredients together to make your very own bouncy ball.








TOWN OF IRON TOYS RICHARD DONOHUE






Cookbook Club


First Meeting: January 24th, 6:00 pm


December 19, 2022

TRUSTEES CORNER

On Friday, November 4th trustees Mary Chabot and Rena Klebart attended the 2022 American Institute of Architects (AIA) of Central Massachusetts design awards dinner. The AIA design awards recognize best practices, innovative thinking and design excellence of AIA members from Central Massachusetts.

This year's recipient was the architectural firm of Oudens Ello. The firm was recognized for their design of the Gladys E. Kelly library of Webster, Massachusetts. The project was selected by a jury made up of distinguished professionals: Stephen Schreiber, professor and chair of the Department of Architecture at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst; Tolya Stonorov, associate director of Norwich University's School of Architecture and John Priestley, a third generation architect and head of his own firm.

It was an honor to be able to celebrate the design of our library and to recognize the architects who made our vision a reality.


